

2018 was another banner year for FOSI, in both the number of programs we offered and the number of people we served. Over the course of the year, we delivered 27 programs with 861 participants, and for the first time we offered at least one program every month of the year. During these events, we witnessed so many moments of wonder and discovery, of community members connecting with one another and forming deeper ties with Sears Island.

We continued to offer a diverse array of programming, including the ever-popular yoga on the beach, sea kayaking, indoor winter talks at the Belfast Library, a variety of nature programs on-island, and seasonal celebrations. This year we also piloted Science Squad, our new place-based monthly after-school program for kids ages 6-12 and their families (read more about this program on page 2). We had our first full house at the Belfast Free Library in November, when archaeologist Paul Bock drew a record crowd of 80 people for his talk, "The Archaeology of Sears Island and the Upper Penobscot Bay." During that popular presentation, we filmed a program for the first time and were able to reach a much wider audience when we shared the video on social media and on community television in Belfast and Searsport. We hope to do more of this in the future. This year we had an unprecedented turnout of 77 people at the two monarch butterfly tagging programs we offered on the island in September. We had many people volunteer to tag butterflies independently for us, allowing us to gather a significant amount of data to send to Monarch Watch, a volunteer, citizen science organization that studies and tracks the fall migration of the monarch butterfly.

Building on the positive public response we saw to last year's winter Solstice by the Sea, we offered our first summer solstice celebration this year, which drew a crowd of 185 people. The event included food trucks, picnicking, music from members of the Belfast Bay Fiddlers, poetry readings, a sun lantern processional, and dancing. Many people came dressed for a midsummer's eve, wearing flower crowns or fairy costumes. It was truly a magical evening to kick off the start of summer! Although weather foiled plans for our second winter solstice celebration, we were inspired by the overwhelming public interest shown in this event and look forward to trying again next year.

Science Squad Update

We recently completed our first year of Science Squad, our new recurring monthly citizen science program for children. We finished out the year strong, having served 220 participants in 9 programs during the months school was in session. This fall we offered a monarch tagging workshop for families, an animal bones discovery workshop, and a nature journaling and observation program. Due to the positive feedback and high attendance numbers we've seen at these programs, we decided to continue offering this program in 2019 using some leftover funds from our Davis Conservation Foundation grant as seed money. However, we need additional funds to keep the program running for the entire year. This innovative program connects local youth with scientific mentors, and engages them as citizen scientists, explorers, and stewards of their local environment. Island News

Our trail crew continues to work tirelessly to maintain public access and make improvements to the conservation area on Sears Island. The crew regularly removes downed trees from the trails, weedwhacks to keep plants from encroaching on pathways, and removes garbage as needed. This year our trail volunteers also replaced vandalized signs and gate locks, took steps to control erosion along the banks to the island entrance, and reset a broken slab over the well at the Homestead site and covered it in wire mesh to keep small animals out of the well and discourage visitors from standing on it. Cow parsnip was also removed from the Homestead Trail.

The Blue Trail got some help this summer from interns in the Community Conservation Corps (CCC), a Waldo County Soil and Water Conservation District program. The eroded trail head at the Tower Road was repaired, and this steep section was improved in terms of safety, access, and water flow. Students from Unity College also completed a volunteer work day on the island in August. The group worked to create drainage ditches along a section of the Tower Road where water was pooling up, and installed new bog bridging on the Blue Trail.

Two organized beach clean-ups were done by kids participating in Science Squad and students from the Maine Ocean School. We would like to thank everyone who volunteered their time to take care of the island this year!

This year Jay Economy and Ann Flack are stepping down from the Advisory Group. We would like to thank them for their dedication and many years of service to FOSI!


FOSI Awarded Capacity-Building Grant by the National Environmental Education Foundation


