


MORE VISITORS DURING 2020

- Despite a reported 32% drop in tourism to Maine this year, we had about 12% more visitors to Sears Island than last year nearly 23,000 cars, from May-September.
- If each car had two people, that's 46,000 visitors. Many are local, but many come from much farther away, including several states and even foreign countries.

PUBLIC PROGRAMS

- FOSI continued to offer many free programs for all ages.
- **Science Squad:** New self-guided "Grab-and-GO" activity kits for families that included supplies and instructions, for pick up at Carver Library.
- "Sears Island Exploration Backpack" contains a spotting scope, a GPS with instructions for geocaching, a field guide, a pocket microscope and more. Pick up at Carver Library.

• Yoga on the Beach drew 48 in two live, outdoor sessions – socially distanced, of course!


• In all, hundreds of people benefited from our programs this

VOLUNTEERS

- FOSI volunteers help with strategic planning, marketing, fundraising, and trail maintenance, among other activities.
- 1,972 volunteer hours of service, with an estimated value of about \$50,148, by national standards.

- In July, Matthew Southard of Boy Scout Troop 34, designed and built a new stairway to the western shore, as his Eagle Scout project, with materials donated by Viking Lumber.
- Our trail team continues to keep things safe for hikers, and we scouted and marked three new possible trails.

New Trails

• FOSI volunteers planned and cut new trails at the south end of the island, one to help people find the remains of the Sears summer homestead, and another leading to a scenic southfacing lookout point about 60' above the shore.



EXPLORING NEW PARTNERSHIPS

- Sears Island is owned by the people of Maine, and FOSI is the designated Land Management Entity for the Conservation Area, in collaboration with the Maine Department of Transportation, the Maine Coast Heritage Trust, and the Town of Searsport
- This year we explored how FOSI might partner with other state agencies whose missions involve recreation, land stewardship and management.







EXPLORING NEW PARTNERSHIPS

- In September, we welcomed the director of Maine's Bureau of Parks and Lands to Sears Island, along with two others from his office, to see if there are other State resources that can be brought to bear in support of our conservation, recreation, and education efforts.
- This was their first visit to Sears Island, and they were impressed.



NEW INTERPRETIVE SIGNS

 Three new interpretive signs were researched, designed and installed, with funding support from the Maine Community Foundation, GBL Charitable Foundation and the Town of Searsport.









December plastic spill

- On December 2, 2020, two bales of "Solid Recovered Fuel" fell into the water while being offloaded from a ship at the Sprague Terminal on Mack Point. Each bale weighed about 2,500 pounds
- One bale broke apart, spreading shredded plastic and other materials along the western beach of Sears Island, requiring a significant cleanup effort. The second bale was recovered intact.
- In addition to a crew paid by Sprague, dozens of volunteers arrived to help, including a few state legislators.
